The past was highly politicised during the socialist period in Eastern/Central Europe. The force of history was invoked to legitimate authority. And collective memory was activated to contest lies and distortions in the historical record. Memory and history were often counterposed in what Havel described as the struggle to slive in truth.

What role did art and architecture play in these processes? And how should this often tendentious art be considered today? By similar measure the historiography of the field needs to be re-examined. What was the relation of scholarship to authority?
